Davis Mountains Scenic Loop

A great way to enjoy the unspoiled beauty of west Texas' Davis Mountains is by taking a leisurely cruise around the Davis Mountains Scenic Loop. The drive is about 75 miles long on TX HWYs 118 and 166, climbing to heights of around 6,700 feet. Here, visitors can view the varied topography, flora, and fauna that the sky island of the Davis Mountains offers, all from the comfort and convenience of your vehicle. Starting in the 1920s, the predecessor to Texas Parks & Wildlife set out to establish a public area in the Davis Mountains, with the idea of having part of HWY 166 act as a "State Park Highway" until a formal park could be established. Construction of the loop began in 1932, was completed in 1947, and is home to the highest statemaintained paved road in Texas, Spur 118 on Mount Locke. Fort Davis is an ideal staging area for your trip around the loop, where you can fill your gas tanks, pick up a map, and get supplies for a picnic, which are all recommended as there are no amenities such as fueling stations or cell service on the loop road. The Davis Mountains Scenic Loop takes drivers past iconic west Texas features, such as the historic Indian Lodge and Davis Mountains State Park, McDonald Observatory, Rockpile Ranch, Sawtooth Mountain, Mount Livermore and the Davis Mountains Preserve, Point of Rocks, and Blue Mountain, with unencumbered views of the distant Puertacitas, Mitre Peak, and the Sierra Viejo Mountains. Without stopping, expect the drive to take about an hour and a half, but it's suggested to allot more time as there are several points along the road to take pictures or have lunch. If you're visiting the area, don't miss out on taking advantage of the countryside that can be seen by driving the Davis Mountains Scenic Loop – and don't forget your camera! Joe Ed Waggoner
